 - Allow food, drinks,
 and cell phone usage
 - Provide wireless internet
- Increase library's hours or adjust them to student needs
- Provide in-person reference services outside the library
 - Hire students for peer reference service
- Host an Amazing Library Race
 - Hold fun-filled library orientation fairs
- Implement a "Freshman Class Librarian" program
- Use Twitter to provide reference help and library news
- Circulate popular technology, such as Kindles and iPods
